I admire your focus on the new and emerging technologies that are being developed to meet the challenges of today. It is my hope that the alternative energy market you write about will become a reality.

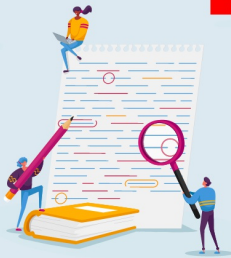
It is indeed in our best interest to embrace the technology of the future.
