

## EXCURSION TO THE ART GALLERY OF NSW

On Tuesday 11th June, our entire Year 7 Visual Arts cohort hit the city for an exciting day at the Art Gallery of NSW to explore the iconic Archibald Prize Portraiture Exhibition, along with the Sulman and Wynne Prize competitions. This awesome outing tied perfectly into their Portraiture Unit from Terms 1 and 2, turning classroom theory into a real-life, visual adventure!

Guided by our amazing Year 11 Visual Arts students (who were total stars), the younger students had the chance to dive deeper into the artworks on display. With help from their older peers and teachers, they unpacked painting techniques, discovered hidden symbolism, and developed a greater appreciation for the stories behind each canvas. After exploring the galleries and enjoying some lunch, students took time to sketch the gallery's beautiful architecture and relax in the surrounding gardens.
